# **Demographics**

#### **Demographics Summary**

IDEA Academy San Benito is an independently managed TItle 1 Part A charter school within the IDEA Public Schools systems in the Rio Grande Valley. It is located in San Benito, TX and founded in 2008. The total size of our enrollment is 793 students. We currently have 82 Pre-K students, 104 Kinder students, 123 1st grade students, 117 2nd graders, 129 3rd grade students, 114 4th grade students, and 124 5th grade students. We have a current staff count of 55 instructional staff members on our campus.

#### **Demographics Strengths**

We currently have 94.92% teacher retention (3 leavers) to be able to provide our scholars with high quality instruction from returning staff. Our student persistence is currently at 96.12% with 32 leavers for various reasons.

#### **Problem Statements Identifying Demographics Needs**

**Problem Statement 1 (Prioritized):** There is a need to increase student persistence specifically for new to IDEA students from 82% to 86%. **Root Cause:** Lack of consistent culture on school transportation and school safety protocols.

**Problem Statement 2 (Prioritized):** There is a need to increase student average daily attendance from 93.94% to 95%. **Root Cause:** Lack of consistency with attendance matrix, student celebrations, parent meetings, and follow up with students, parents, and teachers.

# **Student Learning**

#### **Student Learning Summary**

Student achievement across all content areas in K-5th has shown growth from the beginning of the year. Consistent observations and coaching with feedback allowed teachers to implement strategies that would impact student acheivement. Teachers also implemented academic monitoring to track the progress of scholars in order to provide the appropriate support for students in need.

#### **Student Learning Strengths**

As a campus, we implemented more vertical alignment among contents and grade levels to be able to share best practices and teach students the skills in the same way across grade levels. Teachers were able to utilize paper based and computer based lessons to provide our scholars the practice they needed on the computer to be familiar with testing during STAAR exams. Our ELA and Math contents in 4th-5th consistently ranked in the top quartile in the district on assessments.

#### **Problem Statements Identifying Student Learning Needs**

**Problem Statement 1 (Prioritized):** There is a need to decrease the number of HB4545 students who are failing STAAR in reading and math from xx to xx. **Root Cause:** With the CSI intervention model currently used, it does not allow our scholars to get the individual support they need for reading on a daily basis.

**Problem Statement 2:** There is a need to increase the number of students meeting their two year growth in CSI Reading from 21% to 50%. **Root Cause:** Students not invested in CSI and some students have done the same program for multiple years with minimal progress.

**Problem Statement 3:** There is a need to increase the average score on extended constructed responses a minimum of 2 points on ELA STAAR exam. **Root Cause:** We have not prioritized the rigor of writing in all contents needed for scholars to be successful on STAAR. We started implementing the strategies they needed to know too late in the school year.

## **School Processes & Programs**

#### **School Processes & Programs Summary**

Our scholars in PK-2nd grade use Reading Mastery (Direct Instruction) for Reading, along with Wit and Wisdom for ELA, and Eureka for Math. Scholars in 3rd-5th use Wit and Wisdom for ELA, Being a Writer for writing, and Eureka for Math. Communication with parents is done through Class Dojo, Facebook, and Remind on a daily and weekly basis to share important information about what is happening at our campus.

#### **School Processes & Programs Strengths**

We were able to provide our scholars with 21st century programming afterschool to allow them to participate in extra curricular activities like sports, Lego club, and homework help.

#### **Problem Statements Identifying School Processes & Programs Needs**

**Problem Statement 1:** There is a need to increase our student enrollment in all grade levels, specifically kinder, to meet the 120 student requirement in each grade level. **Root Cause:** Lack of consistent recruiting throughout the school year and not working toward gathering a wait list for each grade level. Students that are recruited do not complete the full registration.

**Problem Statement 2 (Prioritized):** There is a need to onboard 100% of our new to IDEA families before the first day of school. **Root Cause:** Lack of follow up with families that have enrolled and registered. Students are starting school without anyone showing them what our school is about and our vision for our school.

# **Perceptions**

#### **Perceptions Summary**

IDEA Academy San Benito had an 87.9% overall staff satisfaction on our Great Places to work survey. Our staff feel that their work is meaningful and are proud of what we accomplish here at SBA. Only 75% feel that our organization is a mentally and emotionally safe place to work, which is an area that we need to work on this year. Our new student persistence is currently at 89.84% with 19 leavers. This is an area that we need to improve upon in order to give all students the opportunity for college.

#### **Perceptions Strengths**

98% of our staff would recommend their manager to other IDEA employees. Overall our teachers feel like they are being coached, supported, and developed as teachers to improve on their TCP.

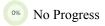

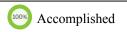

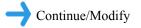
